 - What makes certain ideas stick with kids?
 - How do we take into account gender differences when teaching children?

Why Kids?

- Develop Firm Foundations
 - Overall, about three out of ten young people who grow up with a Christian background stay faithful to church and to faith throughout their transitions from the teen years through their twenties.
- Might not get another chance
 - Young people are dropping out earlier, staying away longer, and if they come back are less likely to see the church as a long-term part of their life.

Why Focus on the Word of God?

- The Word is Paramount
 - "This means Millennials who retain a longer-lasting faith than their peers are more likely to find a sense of authority in the Word of God—

both in the pages of the Bible as well as in their experience of intimacy with the God they follow," Kinnaman says.

- Lines up with our Identity
 - "This is the covenant I will make with them after that time, says the Lord.
 I will put my laws in their hearts, and I will write them on their minds
 ~ Hebrews 10:16
- Exciting!
 - 1. Challenges us (Col 2:2-3, Eph 3:16-19)
 - 2. Useful toward goal accomplishment (2 Tim 3:16-17, Phil 3:12-14)
 - 3. Rewarding and pleasurable (Psalm 94:19, Psalm 4:8)
 - 4. Do it with others (Acts 2:42)

How to teach kids about God's Word?

Manage___expectations_____!

- 1. Simple
 - 1 main point
 - Cut and cut and cut, stay on target
 - Danger of knowledge
 - The Word?
 - Pick 1 aspect per lesson, explain it succinctly
 - Don't bore kids with too much detail
 - Leave them wanting more
- 2. Unexpected
 - Break the pattern
 - Sunday "school"= immediate lost interest
 - Games, fun questions, facts to get attention (sharks and dogs)
 - Challenging questions (with answers other than God, Jesus or love)
 - The Word?
 - Use pictures
 - Ask their opinions?
 - Get on their level (figuratively and literally)
- 3. Concrete
 - Fight against the abstract (jobschmob.com)
 - Foundation for higher level understanding
 - Focused vs. too narrow
 - Ex. 5 silly things people in the world have done
 - vs. 5 silly things people in your church have done
 - vs. 5 silly things people in your church have done in the last 2 days
 - The Word?
 - Explain tough words
 - Don't use church-ese
- 4. Credible
 - Person?
 - Are you credible? Can kids see excitement about God's Word in you?
 - Data?
 - Answers to their big questions?

- The Word?
 - Let the Bible impact you regularly
 - Be aware of the lines of attack on the Bible and how to defend it
- 5. Emotional
 - Appeal to their identity
 - Made in God's image
 - Innate care for other people
 - Empathy develops from the particulars, not the overall patterns
 - Giving to an individual vs. organization
 - The Word?
 - Tie the Word of God to vibrant relationship with Him
 - Show opportunity for discovery and joy
- 6. Stories
 - Ties other aspects together
 - Usable framework
 - Active vs. passive audience, more involved
 - Songs
 - The Word?
 - Talk about what you're reading
 - Talk about how God's word has changed your life

(Part 2)---Accounting for Gender Differences

- 1. Vision
 - Boys have more developed vision for location, direction and speed
 - Girls have more developed vision for color and texture
 - Eye Anatomy
 - The male retina is substantially thicker than the female retina. That's because the male retina has mostly the larger, thicker M cells while the female retina has predominantly the smaller, thinner P ganglion cells
 - ▼ Pg. 21. Why Gender Matter, Dr. Leonard Sax
 - Boys see still and moving objects better than girls. They also have a better sense of perspective. This is due to the M ganglion cells in their retinas. In contrast, girls' retinas have P ganglion cells that are better suited to detecting fine detail.
 - ▼ Pg. 50. Wired To Move, Ruth Hanford Morhard
 - Boys draw verbs, girls draw nouns

- The Word?
 - Know your classroom
 - Mix up you your teaching styles
 - Use fine detail as well as action when developing visual aids

2. Hearing

- Boys do not hear as well, but have a higher threshold for noise
- Girls hear nearly twice as well as boys, and are especially sensitive to soft sounds and tone of voice

• The Word?

- Know your classroom
- Move around, a lot!
- Vary the tone, pitch and volume of your voice
- Emphasize aspects of your presentation using visual aids

Conclusions

- Connect with your own excitement about God's Word.
 - You can't give what you don't have. Kids can tell when you are being fake and you'll lose their attention and interest
- Stay focused
 - O The amount of data you have doesn't need to be shared all at once
 - O Find the most important point and stick to that
 - Lessons/active teaching time < 10 minutes
- Use stories and pictures to help kids connect with the concrete aspects of God's Word
 - Help them connect with what they can experience so they'll extrapolate their connection to what they can't directly experience
- Boredom is your worst enemy!
 - Always aim for short, fun and memorable
